

2010 Iowa Blues Challenge Solo/Duo Competition

The Central Iowa Blues Society, Mississippi Valley Blues Society and Lizard Creek Blues Society are seeking applicants for the 2010 Iowa Blues Challenge Solo/Duo competition. A one round competition will be held in Des Moines, Iowa at Blues on Grand on Sunday, September 12, 2010 starting at 5 PM. (If needed, another round may be added Sunday, September 19, 2010.) The winner of the Challenge will receive a cash prize along with travel expenses and will represent the Blues Societies of Iowa at the International Blues Challenge Solo/Duo competition in Memphis early next year.

The competition is open to any solo or duo act from the state of Iowa. "Solo/Duo" is defined as any act with one or two musicians. Vocalists are counted as musicians for the purpose of this competition. Both electric and acoustic instruments are allowed. Participants will be judged by the same criteria that are used in Memphis for the International Blues Challenge. Each band is

judged based on Blues Content, Talent, Originality and Stage Presence.

Any artist whose name has appeared on a final Handy/Blues Music Award ballot is ineligible. No other entry restrictions apply. This means that management contracts, booking agent contracts, recording contracts, performance contracts (even those that include regular television or radio broadcast) and nationally distributed recordings have no bearing on eligibility.



AUNT KIZZY'Z BOYZ

Thursday, August 26th at 5:30pm • The New Lift Lounge

Aunt Kizzy'z Boyz placed second in the International Blues Challenge, but their power spans music genres. They won the LAMN Jam Grand Slam Urban Artist of the Year title by a landslide, crushing the youthful competi-

tion with charisma, musicianship and fantastic tunes. Not only did they beat out hundreds of competitors, they signed a record deal on the spot. Judge Danny Carter, Interscope Records A & R scout, heavily steeped in contemporary urban and hip hop music, gave some of the evening's most heartfelt words. "... I just feel I got treated to something special tonight. As an A&R, I go back and study all the music and predecessors that came before me. And you showed me tonight I haven't

really done proper research on blues. But I walk out of here tonight a blues fan because of you. People like you motivate me to do what I do, to try to be the best. I just watched you on stage, there's music pumping through your veins, you're gettin' pleasure out of being here. Like I said, you inspire me to do what I do. So thank you!"

The band members are: Bastos "Mo" Moenho, a self taught

percussionist, singer, and a real crowd pleaser; Jim King, a soulful guitar master and vocalist who has been tearin' up Southern California for over 25 years and released his own CD, When the Blues are Green; Leo Dombecki, for-

merly with Ike Turner and now with Ravi Shakar, plays keyboards and Hammond B3; Joe Schiavone takes the bass to new levels and contributes back up vocals; Dwane Hathorn keeps the band and the audience on their feet as he drives the beat with relentless drum rhythms. This band melds together in perfect sync and purpose, making it difficult to determine who is having more fun, the audience or the band!

"Not only will you be blown away by their musical talents, but their

high energy, soulful stage performance is mesmerizing. The energy they create on stage is like being picked up by a twister, and at the end of the night when you touch back down, you won't know what hit you; but you will feel great. The Boyz call it being "Kizzyfied"!

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
LES DUDEK

Wednesday, August 25th • The Lift Lounge-5:30pm

The Beatles caught Les' ear at an early age. In 1962, at the age of ten, Les asked his parents for a guitar for Christmas. They bought him an acoustic guitar from Sears & Roebuck. His musical influences, along with The Beatles, were Cream, Jimi Hendrix, and The Ventures. He had built quite a reputation around the Florida area as a proficient guitar player, having started playing in local bands as a teenager. Those bands were "The United Sounds", "Blue Truth" and "Power". That reputation would place him in the studio with the

Allman Brothers Band for the recording of the *Brothers & Sisters* album. He played lead guitar on the well-known song "Ramblin' Man" and acoustic guitar on "Jessica".

His next stops were as a guitarist for Boz Scaggs and The Steve Miller Band. Dudek was invited to play in a supergroup called Journey but he had received an offer to record for Columbia Records as a solo artist. He recorded four solo albums for Columbia Records, "Les Dudek" (Debut), "Say No More", "Ghost Town Parade" and "Gypsy Ride". His work was praised by the critics but widespread fame and success eluded him. He had two minor hits with "City Magic" and "Old Judge Jones" which were played frequently on local radio stations in the Los Angeles, California area, where he lived at the time, having moved to West Hollywood in the mid-1970s. [citation needed]



He later collaborated with Cher, Stevie Nicks, and with two other Columbia Artists, Mike Finnegan and Jim Krueger, with whom he formed DFK (Dudek, Finnegan, and Krueger) in 1978. A DFK album was released by Columbia Records a year later.

Between the years 1979 and 1982, Les and Cher had a personal as well as professional relationship.^[2] Dudek wrote and performed some of the music for the 1984 movie *Mask* starring Cher, Sam Elliott, Eric Stoltz, and Laura Dern. He had a small part in the film

as "Bone", a biker. He has worked for NBC, ABC, ESPN, Fox Sports, and E! Entertainment Television. He can be heard on many television series including *Friends*.

In 1989, he did a brief stint with legendary Canadian rock group John Kay & Steppenwolf as their guitarist. But problems developed between Dudek and Kay which led to him leaving the band after only one month on tour.

1991 Les played guitar with Stevie Nicks on her "Whole Lot Of Trouble" tour.

Two more solo Cds later, "Deeper Shades Of Blues" and "Freestyle", Dudek hit the road again with his own band, and has been performing songs from all his records, plus a few hits he's recorded with other artists.



PLAYING WITH FIRE

Playing With Fire was hotter than hell in more ways than one... With the heat index in Omaha hovering around 110 on this day I thanked my lucky stars for the dedication I have to always maintain myself in peak physical condition or I woulda been a "Gone Johnson".

Anyone buying that?

Needless to say the show went off without a hitch. I was checking ID's at the front gate from 4--7 and missed pictures of the Blues Ed kids and the Randy Oxford band out of Portland , but man could I hear them.

Randy Oxford is one hell of a Trombone player and a very nice guy as I would find out at the After Jam in the Union Bar in the downtown Holiday Inn; both early bands also featured lead female vocals that were dynamite.

You would have never guessed we were all standing in Guam like conditions by watching Gordon Beadle or "Sax Gordon" to his fans and those in the biz; he was hopping around blowing that horn like it was last performance ever. I have heard a lot of Sax players in my day but none of them seem to play with the unbridled passion, reckless abandon,

and pure love of his craft that Sax Gordon does.

I saw Sax Gordon play 2 years ago in the winter PWF series and I thought he stole the show! I have made myself a promise to see him anytime he is within a 200 mile radius, you should too he is worth the drive. Tonight he brought his own horn section, Guitar and drummer and they played off each other very well.

When Sax man is not blowing the horn he is constantly ad-libbing and jabbering with the crowd... Sugar Ray Norica and The Bluetones closed the show and were a big hit. Sugar Ray was the front man for Roomful of Blues in the early thru mid nineties. Ray has a big, but

mellow vocal style that is very unique and easy to listen to, if you were going to look up swinging in Webster's unabridged there would be a picture of Sugar Ray blowing a big ole Chromatic Harp.

Playing with Sugar Ray was Monster Mike Welch on Guitar... Terry O booked these guys a few years back for a OBS Blues Cruise when Monster Mike was just a pup, and the hottest new deal to hit the blues scene in a while, his resume has thickened considerably since then. The Bluestones also feature a 3 piece horn section; stand up bass, and a great drummer.

I'm a huge Horn fan, it should be Tribal Law that no band travels without one... At the After Jam there was a 7, count em a 7 piece horn section featuring Randy Oxford and Sax Gordon, Sugar Ray on harp and vocals, Monster Mike on Guitar and a handful of Blues Ed kids showing their stuff.

The place was packed to the gills and the wedding party who wandered in $\frac{1}{2}$ way thru this Jam didn't know what hit them, the playing went on past 1:30 AM.



Son of '76 & the Watchmen · Letters from Shangri-La

"Letters from Shangri-La" is the latest release from the Nebraska based roots rock band, 'Son of '76 & the Watchmen.' Debut albums often tend to be a "kitchen sink" affair where the band throws in years of songwriting creating an album of mixed styles, multiple themes and influences. That this is the third album from the band only



adds to their genre defying mystic. Unfocused albums require more interactive listening and since an uncommitted fan is, at best, a passive listener, this album does not unfold itself easily to the ear.

Led by Josh Hoyer's rootsy barenecked vocals, the album includes songs with a hint of New Orleans (Katrina Revisited), a harkening of Ireland (Annie's Heart), Roy Orbinson (The Moon) and an Americana base that transcends defined categories; think of Tom Waits fronting the Outlaws singing Dave Alvin material from the 'Blackjack David' period. Because of the length, 15 songs, the album can easily lose the listener as it jumps from style to style. This is an album that will challenge the listener's commitment to wait, listen and find the beauty that lies within.

Hoyer uses the album to sing about two of the region's darkest themes.

On his 1982 release, 'Nebraska' Bruce Springsteen sang of a mass murder spree in 1958 that spread across Nebraska and into Wyoming. Born in Lincoln, Nebraska, Charlie Starkweather and accomplice Caril Ann Fugate spread fear across the state as they murdered her family and others. While Springsteen sang from Starkweather's perspective, Hoyer sings from the perspective of the fictional son of Starkweather. It is a harkening to the dust bowl song theme of criminals and hero's. On 'Outside Looking In' Hoyer sings of Nebraska's shame today: Whiteclay is an unincorporated village of 14 residents with four package stores that peddle 3 to 4 million cans of beer per year to the dry Native American Pine

Burnside stuff, completely bluesy and fun. Case is not the most strong of vocalists in this style but a very talented writer that is having a rocking good time. (and no MIND-LESS SCREAMING GUITARS). My highlights on "Dig" are "Dig what youre putting down", "30 Days in the workhouse", "Somebody told the truth" and "Look out". Buy it and crank it up! (sorry I just said that). I strapped on my guitar and was jumping around the living room and I really can't Play. (Dont tell anyone).

This months "Got to Own" classic is "Muddy Waters" Hard again! If you do not have this record, please don't talk to me.

Ridge Indian Reservation's 38,000 residents. Much like the track 'Place I Know,' from Indigenous, Hoyer sings of the alienation and hopelessness of living amid a Reservation community where alcoholism rates exceed 60% of the adult population.

Devoid of overt catchy pop-tracks, "Shangri-La" leans heavily on the piano tracks of Nicholas Semrad to hold the band's sound together by moving smoothly behind the lead instruments adding depth and texture.

At its core this is a very good but complex album that does not easily unfold. Anyone willing to invest the effort to experience the immense depth of this record will become acquainted with a true artistic expression that sets aside any pretext towards commercialism. A glance at today's sonic landscape puts 'The Watchmen' in a vein of developing along a line of contemporary music that haunts dingy taverns and make-shift venues aspiring towards an appearance on Austin City Limits. For the true music connoisseur this record will become a precious gem but recognized as such by only a few. The songs are well composed and the musicians bring the songs to life. After numerous listenings the album rises above well above 'regional release quality' to become a solid foundation for national aspiration. Time and again we see maturing artist focus their sound to capture a wider audience. While this tact can build an audience, it is often done at the expense of art.

Being a recovered independent retailer, I appreciate the bands' 'Big Box Store' track bemoaning the homogenization of America's small towns and retail landscape. More accomplished radio hosts might focus in on 'She's the Kind of Woman' or the beautiful uptempo 'Avalee,' where Hoyer sings to instill hope in a daughter and that she has "got to believe" something better awaits in her future. Should 'Son of '76 & the Watchmen' cast aside the comforts of home and hit the road something better may await their future: this is an act with promise and worthy of keeping an eye on.

Sharon Jones & the Dap-Kings I Learned The Hard Way

The is one of the best new cd's I have heard in quite some time. It is timeless, and brings to mind the best of Motown and Stax. Jones' cd should be an early candidate for soul/blues cd of the year.



Jones has a voice like many classic soul singers that is rough, yet somehow smooth simul-

taneously. She reminds one of Etta James, Aretha Franklin, and Irma Thomas. Her singing has a dramatic, but never over-the top flare that is well suited for the material that ranges from Memphis soul to doo-wop.

The Dap-Kings are a fine horn driven eight piece band that practice restraint when delivering funky sounds from the past and still manage to sound completely modern. The rhythm section is always in-the- pocket and supportive of Ms. Jones.

This is an outstanding cd that I highly recommend to anyone that is interested in soul/blues. It is a cd that some reviewers are calling an instant classic, and I tend to agree.





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
