

Guitarist and singer/songwriter Shannon Curfman burst upon the blues and roots rock scene in 1999 with her major-label debut for Arista Records, Loud Guitars, Big Suspicions. Her exceptionally well-produced, debut album won her rave reviews all over the U.S. Canada. Europe and Asia, aside from lots of airplay on radio stations in the U.S. Curfman made several U.S. club and theater tours in support of Loud Guitars, Big Suspicions, and garnered huge amounts of publicity, because she was only 14 at the time. Now 28, Curfman is back with a new and even more mature album that shows she is the real-deal, proven artist that many thought she would develop into.

"What You're Getting Into" is Curfman's new album recorded at Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis' epic Flyte Tyme Studios in Minneapolis , MN. Special guests on the album include



platinum-selling artist Bonamassa playing and singing a duet with Shannon of a classic Eric Clapton song and multi-platinum artist Stevie D from Buckcherry on a cover of a song by Queen. This is Shannon 's best album vet! The album features seven brand new, original songs that Curfman co-wrote with writers from Aerosmith, Lenny Kravitz, Kid Rock, Ozzy Osbourne, Jonny Lang and Sheryl Crow and a cover of Oh Well by Fleetwood Mac that goes to show what a powerhouse Shannon really is. Between the songwriting, Curfman's saucy and demanding vocals and her scorching lead guitar What You're Getting Into is the album of 2010 not to be missed.

Why is BluesEd different than other youth development programs in the area? Here are the top 10 reasons that make BluesEd so special.

- 1) BluesEd started in 2002, making it the oldest (and most experienced) of its kind in Omaha.
- 2) We have four clinicians who work with each band and are working, well-known musicians in the Omaha/Midwest region.
- 3) We have 5-6 performance bands a season. Our season runs from April August, not just a couple of weeks in the summer.
- 4) Our bands play at multiple venues and multiple times during the season, not just one season ending performance.
- 5) The Blues Society of Omaha is our sponsor and provides financial, educational and moral support to our bands.

ROSS KLEINER AND THE THRILL

Ross Kleiner & The Thrill are no mere revivalists. Like Nick Curran, JD McPherson, and Nikki Hill, the Minneapolis, Minnesota-based Kleiner infuses vintage forms with unexpected accents, producing music that is both respectful of its sources and strikingly original. The combination of hot rhythms with cool lyrics, the judicious application of modern sounds and production values, and the energy of an H-bomb, yields explosive results in The Thrill's wild, exciting brand of hi-test roots rock.

The charismatic Kleiner fronts a versatile and dynamic group, formed in the fall of 2012 with Victor Span, whose resume includes stints with Hubert Sumlin, James Cotton, Buddy Guy, and Nick Moss, on drums; Elmer Johnston on the big bass; and a devastating secret weapon in guitarist Cornelius Watson. Listeners seeking something a little off the beaten path have been rewarded by the Thrill's electrifying live shows, where vintage vibe meets up-to-date attitude. The debut album You Don't Move Me, which captured the group's fresh sound and Kleiner's solidly rocking, melodic material, was released late in 2013 to rave reviews.

As Blues Music Magazine's Tom Hyslop wrote, the band "approaches rock 'n' roll music with a fan's heart and an expert's ear, and gets it entirely right." Kleiner appreciates the rockabilly classicism of Elvis Presley, Johnny Burnette and the Rock 'n Roll Trio, and Gene Vincent, but that represents only one aspect of his influences. Add to it the essential inspiration of iconic bluesmen like Howlin' Wolf and innovative rockers like Bo Diddley, with dashes of surf, spaghetti Western, Latin, swinging pop, and much more. The dangerous edge of the Paladins, the brooding exoticism of Chris Isaak, the raw attack of the Blasters, and the brash, no-filter style of Nick Curran all figure into Kleiner's musical cocktail shaker, yet his potion remains unique retro-modern American music, done in all the right ways.

These are some of my favorite musicians on planet earth. My dream band. We all have one thing in common, make the music feel good! My sincerest gratitude to all the musicians for their heartfelt performances. It is no surprise that this most important album to me is being released on Ruf Records. I have wanted to be a Ruf recording artist since 1998. Thomas Ruf and I have tried many times get together over the years but the Universe wasn't ready for us until now! So, this is my Texas album. My story of Texas. The history, the culture, the music and the amazing pride that shines on every Lone Star flag. I am truly thankful for my life, love, friends and family. God Bless Texas.

The Chris Duarte Group emerged on the scene out of Austin, Texas, in the early 90's and gained notoriety after wowing a packed room of industry insiders at the South X Southwest convention. In the wake of Stevie Ray Vaughan's passing,

Duarte quickly gained a national reputation as a young man imbued with a playing style comparable at times to the late guitarist.

After fielding interest from a number of labels, Duarte signed to Silvertone Records and his debut album "Texas Sugar/ Strat Magik" reportedly sold in excess of 100,000 units in the United



States, no small feat for a blues/rock guitarist. This, coupled with Duarte's strong commitment to touring, was the impetus for Chris' winning the "Best New Talent" in Guitar Player's 1995 Reader's Poll. He also finished fourth in the magazine's "Best Blues Guitarist" category that year behind legends Eric Clapton, Buddy Guy, and B.B. King.

Throughout the last decade, Duarte honed his chops as a guitarist, songwriter, and singer as he recorded three more critically acclaimed records, "Tailspin Headwhack" in 1997, "Love Is Greater Than Me" in 2000 and "Romp" 2003, the latter two of which were on the Zoe/Rounder label.

Not one to rest on his laurels, Duarte has constantly worked on his growth as a musician and the years of recording culminated purposefully in this past decade's "Blue Velocity", "Vantage Point", "396" with Bluestone Company, "Blues In The Afterburner", "Something Old, Something New, Something Borrowed, All Things Blue", "Infinite Energy", "My Soul Alone", and 2013's "Chris Duarte Group Live". All records aptly showcase many sides of this brilliant artist in the context of high energy blues rock with moments that bring to mind legendary artists as diverse as Stevie Ray Vaughan, Robin Trower, Jimi Hendrix, and Eric Johnson.

Chris' recordings have always been rooted firmly in the blues with a rock and roll edge which further established Duarte as one of the rare musical talents of his generation. "Lucky 13" continues in the tradition of contemporary blues rock with bursts of fusion, pop, and heavy psychedelia throughout. This CD contains a heavy dose of Duarte's legendary blues guitar chops over a diverse set of grooves and lyrical themes.

ANTHONY GOMES

Here is a band that is moving rapidly into the future, but is experienced enough to learn from the masters of the past. Their music is a raw example of the old Delta-style blues mixed with some very original guitar phrasings. Anthony Gomes (lead singer and lead guitarist) formed a band that is infectious. They had their first public appearance in Chicago in April of 1997, and everyone in the industry was talking about the Anthony Gomes Band. In the spring of 1998 they took first place in Buddy Guy's Legends first annual "Best Unsigned Blues Band" competition, winning \$10,000 in prizes. Guy himself was on hand to congratu-

late them. To be singled out as the top blues band in the Chicago area is a great honor that has helped gain them national and regional attention. Some of the national legends they



have shared the stage with are Buddy Guy, Koko Taylor, Jimmy Johnson, Lucky Peterson, Eddie King, Smokin' Joe Kubek, Big Jack Johnson, Otis Clay, Eddie C. Campbell, Bar-Kays, Clarence "Gatemouth" Brown and Sugar Blue. In May of 1998, Anthony Gomes signed an endorsement deal with Fender guitars. In 1999, a custom model guitar was being manufactured to the artist's specifications. Gomes describes it as a cross between Albert Collins' and B.B.King's guitars, a set-neck, hollow-body Telecaster with Humbucking pickups on it. If you are searching for some of the hottest Delta-style blues music, blended with

Texas blues guitar, done with a Jimi Hendrix finesse, and coming from a native Chicago blues band, then the Anthony Gomes Band is your answer.

ROCKIN' JOHNNY BURGIN

Johnny Burgin was born in the wrong time and place. Although he grew up in the fertile blues ground of Mississippi, he never absorbed the music in its Delta home. Instead, his indoctrination arrived when he discovered West Side Chicago blues, diving into the raw sound and transforming himself from a quiet University of Chicago student into a guitar-playing blues singer dubbed Rockin' Johnny. Playing old-school, '50s-era blues in a Midwestern city a long way from his Southern roots, Burgin handles the guitar like he was raised along Lake

Street during the struggles of the postwar years.

It wasn't until he landed in Chicago to attend the University of Chicago that Burgin grasped a pivotal connection for his retro fascination. "When I got to the West Side, I realized that I couldn't play at all," he says. "I threw it all out and started from scratch." Leaving behind his folk rock tastes, Burgin immersed himself in West Side blues. "I had to see the blues in its context," he says. "Once I saw live blues in West Side clubs, that's all I wanted to listen to."

It's clear that gritty West Side blues riffs are a major influence for Burgin on his latest release, Grim Reaper (Delmark). The 15-track album showcases his sharp fretwork and respectful delivery of unvarnished 12-bar blues through a mix of covers and originals, with energetic renditions of "Rollin' And Tumblin'" and "Somebody Loan Me A Dime" as standouts. The disc displays Burgin's mastery, gleaned from playing and listening to mentors like Tail Dragger and Sam Lay.

In his '90s heyday as Rockin' Johnny, Burgin often backed seasoned blues stars. He took West Side blues to the North Side, holding court every Monday at Smoke Daddy in Wicker Park, introducing the genre to young hipsters who have never seen the inside of a blues club. Soon he was also regularly performing at legendary West Side blues clubs. "I played every Saturday at the Delta Fish Market on Jackson and Kedzie," he recalls. "Every musician on the West Side came by the market and I got to meet and play with everybody.""

But by 2002 he dropped out of the blues scene, leaving his gigs and friendships behind. Focusing his attention on married life and raising his daughter, Burgin didn't pick up his guitar for seven straight years. "The social part [of the blues scene] was what I missed," he says. "It's not just a business, these are my friends. You're lucky enough to make some money as well as enjoy a social life with this."

Burgin returned to the blues scene in 2010 after his marriage ended and stints working "a bunch of jobs." "I didn't even



know if I could do it anymore," he says of his return. "There was a lot of tension in the air when I played the first few notes and then there was this sense of relief."

Burgin quickly resumed his busy performance schedule, regaining his weekly Smoke Daddy gig and playing local and regional clubs. "I had to grow into this music," he explains. "Things came to me really fast at the beginning. I've done all of this stuff, but I'm basically the same. I can savor it a lot more now. I don't feel the pressure that I did be-

fore. I'm just enjoying myself; it's nice to be older and wiser."

Coming full circle as an eager 20-something blues guitarist learning the ropes from blues masters to a seasoned performer comfortable in his own skin, Burgin feels that he and the blues are in a good place. "The blues is too good to go away," he says. "The blues will never die."


