

The International Blues Challenge represents the worldwide search for those Blues Bands and Solo/Duo Blues Acts ready to perform on the international stage, yet just needing that extra big break. Each Affiliate of The Blues Foundation has the right to send a band and a solo/duo act to represent its organization at the IBC.

The IBC is judged by blues professionals from across the world who have years of experience in listening to, producing, and creating blues music. The Blues Foundation has established a set of criteria by which all acts are evaluated throughout the five days of the IBC.

Affiliated organizations are required to stage a regional preliminary IBC competition, with the winner of that event representing the organization in the International Blues Challenge held annually in Memphis, TN along historic Beale Street. While Affiliated Organizations are encouraged to follow The Blues Foundation's structure and rules during their local challenges, each organization is free to structure its preliminary rounds as it sees fit, as long as a true challenge between multiple acts takes place resulting in a single band and/or solo/duo act being identified.

Joyann Parker brings a full range of talent to her performances as an accomplished singer, pianist, guitarist and songwriter. She has performed for thousands at major venues and festivals across the country,

frequently sells out the most prestigious clubs in the Twin Cities and garnered national and international attention for her newest record, "Hard To Love."

Joyann is a 2018 Blues Blast Magazine Music Award nominee and Heritage guitars artist. She has opened for Grammy winner Robert Cray, taken the stage for Grammy nominee Elvin Bishop in a pinch, represented Minnesota at the 2015 International Blues Competition in Memphis, TN and won the award for 2016's Best Self-Produced CD from the Minnesota Blues Society.

After singing in church most of her life, Joyann Parker embraced the blues. A classically trained pianist with a degree in music from the University of Wisconsin–La Crosse, Parker loves the music's heartfelt honesty.

"I didn't know anything about blues until about four years ago," the Minneapolis-based singer, songwriter, band leader and multi-instrumentalist says. "But then it just clicked. I said, "This is what I am supposed to do."

On April 13, Parker released her new album, "Hard To Love." The project offers more evidence of the singer's new-found blues power. Parker co-wrote and co-produced the album's 13 songs with Mark Lamoine, guitarist in the band. The selections include the inspirational, gospel-linked "Home," the Memphis soul-style "Envy" and Motown-based "Dizzy."

Before Parker became a blues singer, she knew only such obvious examples as Eric Clapton's and Led Zeppelin's blues interpretations. The door to authentic blues and soul music



opened almost accidentally. After Parker sang Aretha Franklin's soul classic, "Chain of Fools," at a singing contest, she received an invitation to join a blues band. Accustomed to studying music formally, Parker consequently educated herself about the blues. "I started going to the blues jams in town, trying to figure out what it's all about," she says. "And that was it. It just clicked for me."

In 2015, Parker traveled to Memphis to be the Minnesota Blues Society's representative in the International Blues Challenge. The experience inspired her to write the songs that appear on Hard to Love. "After I went to the Stax Museum in Memphis, it was like somebody lit a fire under me," she says. "I thought, 'I love this music. I

want to write it.' I went home and wrote the songs. When I give myself time to be creative and I'm inspired, too, music just comes out of me."

Every song Parker writes comes from the heart. "But they're not all about me by any means," she says. "I believe part of being a songwriter is taking your story and weaving it with other people's stories. Together, they make a good story. And I don't write 'Oh, baby, oh, baby' lyrics. I can't do that. I write songs that somebody, somewhere may hear and then say, 'Oh. How does she know me?' People always come see me after a show. I love that. When a song I wrote affects people's lives, that's great for the songwriter in me."

Because she sings and composes songs that have emotional honesty, Parker is very much in the great American blues tradition. "I love the realism of blues so much," she says. "It's so earthy. Blues doesn't pull any punches. I can't help but be moved by that."

Parker wants anyone who doesn't know the blues genre to experience the indigenous American music that's been so influential on the world's music. "I've been performing for some younger crowds," she says. "They say they don't like blues. People in general say that. I tell them, 'I think you do.' And after I perform something for them, they say, 'Oh. I love that song.' I say, 'That's blues.' Every kind of music they like comes from blues. The music in a restaurant, in a movie or TV soundtrack, there's always a blues tune."

Eddie Turner has done just about everything. A guitarist since age 12, he honed his skills alongside San Francisco's legendary Tracy Nelson & Mother Earth in the '70s and Denver's hard-hitting Zephyr in the '80s, before becoming a founding member of the Otis Taylor Band in the '90s and then earning a prestigious Blues Music Award nomination for his own solo career in the mid-2000s.

The Denver-based guitarist, singer and bandleader has toured the world, garnering countless fans and an outpouring of critical acclaim in the process.

But "Naked ... In Your Face" marks a first for Turner, who has never before released an in-concert recording. The title tells you all you need to know: No shrinking violet of a live album, this varied, vibrant set finds the musician at his most stylistically audacious, crossing boundaries with the same brazen confidence he's shown throughout his career. Recorded last August at The Blues Can in Calgary, Alberta, during a tour of Canada and the western United States, the album features Turner in a power-trio format. Joining him are bassist Anna Lisa Hughes, a fellow Denver resident who sings lead on several cuts here, including covers of classics such as "Don't Let Me Be Misunderstood" and "Buried Alive in the Blues" as well as her original composition "Mistreated," and drummer Kelly Kruse, an in-demand sideman in Canada who also plays guitar with Calgary's Adele & the Krusers.

"I still get emails saying, "That was one of the best bands I've ever seen. When are you going to tour again?" says Turner. "And I loved the way Anna Lisa's voice and mine meshed together. The three of us came together and threw all our influences into a pot, ending up with something that's completely different. I wanted to record songs that, without this particular band, I'll probably never do again."

Fitting for a man who grew up outside of Chicago watching iconic blues figures such as Muddy Waters and Howlin' Wolf ply their trade — but also seeing acts like Jimi Hendrix and Cream take the music to new, more rock-influenced directions — Turner has developed a sound that's informed by tradition yet adventurous enough to not be limited by it. As the man himself puts it, "If you want to be a purist, be one not because you started there and stopped there. Be one

because you went everywhere else and decided to come back. Because no music is truly pure. Everything has a little dirt in it."





Born into a musical family in 1957 in Los Angeles, James Armstrong had blues music in his blood from the very start. His Mom was a blues singer, his Dad played jazz guitar. Armstrong formed his first band in the 7th grade, and by age 17 he was touring the country.

James would start making waves on the local California blues circuit by his 20s, becoming the youngest member of Smokey Wilson's band. In the 1980s, James was a founding member of

the band Mama Roo and received his first recording contract for Crescendo Records.

In the early 90s, James got plenty of exposure from his musical influences, including Albert Collins, and Sam Taylor. Shortly after that, he was discovered and signed by High-Tone Records owner Bruce Bromberg, who discovered and signed Robert Cray and Joe Louis Walker.

Armstrong was about to tour with his critically acclaimed first album, Sleeping with a Stranger, when tragedy struck. The events surrounding a home invasion left Armstrong without the use of his left hand and arm, including permanent nerve damage. This threatened to end his career forever; but thanks to the support of friends, fans and the blues community, Armstrong came back two years later with a second album, Dark Night.

What Armstrong lost in the tragedy he gained in "a whole new respect for the music itself, the power in slow blues, how the silences between the notes are as important as the notes." Armstrong also turned his efforts to perfecting his songwriting, vocal and slide guitar skills, all the while developing his gift for turning hardship into song. The results were a third album, Got It Goin' On. The CD garnered two Blues Music Award nominations for "best blues guitarist" and for "best song of the year" with "Pennies and Picks."

James was also noticed by the music industry, having songs in three major motion pictures. "Bank of Love" was used in Hear No Evil, with Martin Sheen and Marlee Matlin. "Two Sides to Every Story" was featured in Speechless with Michael Keaton and Geena Davis, and also in The Florentine with Jeremy Davies and Luke Perry.

Over the years, Armstrong has performed in many countries throughout North America, Europe, Scandinavia, Asia and the Middle East. Armstrong has shared the stage with many artists like 'Keb Mo', Coco Montoya, Chaka Kahn, Tommy Castro, Shemekia Copeland, Tab Benoit, Charlie Mussel-white, Walter Trout, Doug MacLeod, Roy Brown, Ricky Lee Jones, Jan and Dean, Mitch Mitchell, and many more.

Blues Been Good to Me. is his latest release on CatFood Records (October 20, 2017). Armstrong released two prior CDs with CatFood Records: Blues at The Border (2011) and Guitar Angels (2014). Both CDs ranked in the top 40 of the year ratings in Living Blues radio charts.

Armstrong continues to tour extensively. He pays tribute to the past with the traditional blues, and his unique song-writing skills. Using both slide and pick, James' guitar playing is some of the smoothest in the business. James regularly brings his vibrant and welcoming live shows to people around the globe.



HAMILTON LOOMIS

Hamilton Loomis does indeed go back to basics on his new album "BASICS", which is his most personal and emotional effort to date. Gone are the double entendres for which Loomis is known; this time, his lyrics are direct, personal, and often autobiographical.

The "basics" theme runs through the entire CD, in its lyrics ("Prayer," "Cloudy Day"), single-chord progressions ("Sugar Baby," "Looking Into a Dream"), simple melodies ("Come and Get Me"), and stripped-down instrumentation of guitar, bass and drums ("Reason," "Getting So Big"). Still, Loomis's trademark deep-grooved funk and soulful blues-rock is definitely present.

"I wanted this record to be more stripped-down. Even the CD jacket is black and white and pretty basic itself," he says of the disc, which features songwriting collaborations with Grammy-award winning songwriter/ producer/bassist Tommy Sims, co-writer of Eric Clapton's "Change the World."

Born and raised in Galveston, Texas, Loomis is the son of musician parents who listened to blues, rock and soul. Music ran in his veins and, with instruments readily available around the house, he picked up drums, piano, guitar and harmonica, honing his multi-instrumental talent in addition to performing regularly as part of his family's doo-wop group.

"My parents had a fantastic record collection and, when I started writing, I gravitated towards what I'd been listening to all my life. I have a huge reverence for the blues and all it encompasses, but I've always been fond of R&B and funky music."

A protégé of Bo Diddley, Loomis met the icon backstage at the age of 16 at Houston's famed venue Rockefeller's. Before the night was over, Loomis was onstage playing guitar with the legend. Diddley quickly

became friend, mentor, collaborator and supporter, appearing on two of Loomis' albums and presenting a cherished red guitar that he still plays.

"That one night began my education and I spent a lot of time with Bo over the years listening to him tell so many stories," said Loomis. "He was so generous and most people don't know that he was really philanthropic. He played free concerts around his hometown for homeless shelters, schools and anyone that just needed help. He was always giving! That's another thing that planted the GIVE IT BACK seed in my mind. It's all coming full circle."

Loomis and crew shine on stage proving his music is best experienced in person, where one can see and hear its intended splendor. Described by Blues Blast Magazine as "a non-stop turbo of power, one minute moving from side to side of the stage, and then taking on his horn player in a head-cutting contest on the apron of the stage the next minute." Loomis' energetic, get-in-with-the-crowd antics are infectious. The swaying and clapping are just as he envisioned.

"Being comfortable on stage is something that comes completely natural to me," he says. "I feel joy when I play music and it literally moves me. It moves my body. I learned long ago that whenever music is coming from you, from deep inside your soul and from the right place, people will feel that on a deeper level and might not even know what's going on inside of themselves. I enjoy engaging the crowd and feel a show should be an interactive experience."

James Harman was born and raised in Anniston, Alabama where he quickly picked up on the blues and soul music being played on juke boxes and the radio. He sang in the church choir until age 16 when his family moved to Panama City Florida, where he found himself surrounded by like-minded blues lovers. Wearing a fake moustache, young James slipped into a still segregated nightclub to see Little Junior Parker's show. He was totally overtaken by the blues and soon became a regular, known as "That boy who sings like a man" by patrons.

While still in his teens, he started playing juke joints and dance clubs throughout the South. His performances became legendary-he was "tapped" by talent scouts, signed and taken to Atlanta, Georgia in 1964 to begin his recording career at age 18.

While living in Miami Harman was befriended by fellow record collectors Henry Vestine, Alan Wilson and Bob Hite of Canned Heat, who persuaded him to move to California, promising to help him get re-started. Harman made his move to SoCal in 1970, and true to their word, Canned Heat insisted on Harman's Icehouse Blues Band as their opening act for many big shows. The Icehouse Blues Band soon became regulars at venues such as The Golden Bear, The Ash Grove, The Troubadour and The Lighthouse, which all booked real blues artists.

Harman was soon in demand for his own shows, as well as backing every living blues artist who was touring without a band. He also opened hundreds of shows for artists who did have their own band. Icehouse Blues Band was a real working blues band. In 1978 James tired of using band names and started billing his act as James Harman Band.

Some alumni include Phil Alvin, Bill Bateman, Gene Taylor, David "Kid" Ramos, Michael "Hollywood Fats" Mann, Stephen Taylor Hodges and Jeff "Big Dad" Turmes. All of these players did long stints in the Harman Band. James is often cited as a band leader who gave many now famous Bluesmen their start.

Nathan James has been James Harman's regular band guitar player since 1997 when he was 19 years old... he turned 37 in 2015 and he's still Harman's favorite! Nathan is also James' recording engineer and co-producer on his own

projects, as well as projects they produce for other artists.

Through his long career starting in the early 60's James Harman has built up an enormous song catalog and had 20 of his original songs used in movies and television. He has been nominated for 20 prestigious W.C. Handy (Blues Foundation) awards. He was inducted into the Alabama Music Hall of Fame, and is the harmonica player of choice on many ZZ Top releases, as well as performing live with them on many international TV shows.

Harman was nominated for a Grammy Award, and won two Blues Music Awards for his contribution to the Blind Pig release, "Remembering Little Walter" in 2014. He is a one of a kind song writer, producer, musician, showman, vocalist and internationally known bluesman.

In 2015 his Electro-Fi release "BONETIME" was nominated for an unprecedented five BMA awards: SONG OF THE YEAR, ALBUM OF THE YEAR, TRADITIONAL ALBUM OF THE YEAR, HARMONICA PLAYER and TRADITIONAL BLUES MALE ARTIST OF THE YEAR.

As a founding member of the critically acclaimed progressive roots outfit Moreland and Arbuckle, vocalist/harmonica player Dustin Arbuckle has been working hard on the road for over a decade. After 15 years, 7 albums, and hundreds of shows across 23 countries, Moreland & Arbuckle have

chosen to amicably go their separate ways.

As one door closes, another opens, and Arbuckle is now ready to explore a wide range of music with his two new projects, Haymakers and Dustin Arbuckle & The Damnations. A musician of vast appetites, he's long held an appreciation for traditional American music in the vein of Charley Patton as well as the cross-pollinated sounds of The Band or Stax-style soul.

A big BSO Thank You to the Primary Purpose Riders Fellowship club that came out for the event, they raised a lot of money for the cause during the breaks.
















CD Reviews



Michael Charles I'm Nobody's Fool

Moonlight Label



Michael Charles is a singer/guitarist from Australia that moved to the United States decades ago to pursue his musical career. He has over thirty releases in his discography. Charles was elected to the Chicago Blues Hall of Fame in 2015. This outing is a cd with a DVD bonus.

In press releases, it states that Charles' guitar is always kept in the forefront and is the driving force behind his music. This is certainly true here.

The album begins and ends interestingly. The song "I Can't Hear Our Song" starts the collection for :27 seconds and is reprised for :28 seconds at the end. It is a slow ballad with just Charles' vocals and acoustic guitar. "I Am Nobody's Fool" is a song I really like. It starts off at a slow pace and just keeps building. "Rag" is an opportunity for Charles to spread his wings with some great soloing.

I would categorize this album as blues/rock, but it is much more varied and nuanced than average for the genre. I think this cd will appeal to music lovers that enjoy blues/rock, but want the music more assorted than a lot of the run-of-the-mill samples that dominate the category now.
