NACE BROTHERS

Thursday, January 21st @ 6 pm (\$10) Stocks N Bonds, Omaha



It all began on New Year's Eve 1981, when guitarist Jimmy Nace and his older brother - drummer and lead singer David Nace - played their first show with bassist Tim Williams. Ever since, the Nace Brothers Band has reaped a sturdy grassroots following over the course of six albums. (There's a seventh in the pipes.) The band primarily plays blues but lays down thick, jammy grooves alongside the slinky whir of T.J. Erhardt's Hammond organ. (There's also fiddle-driven bluegrass and country twang.) The crisp, lively playing is a joy to watch, but the highlight is David Nace's soulful singing, delivered with a rough-hewn swagger. The legacy has been handed down for three generations. The brothers' father, Johnny Nace, scored two big regional hits ("Blue Notes" and "Midnight Train") in 1968. Their grandfather, Percy Nace, was a bluegrass fiddler, and his father, Valandingham Nace, was a classically trained violinist. You know what they say: like father, like son.

In August of 2017 bassist Paul Greenlease left to pursue new musical endeavors. His departure was very smooth and professional. It also opened the door for new comer Chase. Chase is 26 years old, from Sedalia MO and seems to be the perfect fit playing the electric and acoustic bass. His knowledge and love of Roots Music has been very uplifting to say the least. His Father, Rick, brought him to see the band for the first time when Chase was 9 years old! His energy and personality are obvious and they shine during every performance. Last year some of our coolest performances were after the gig. The acoustic bass makes for a great after party jam. Just another example of how much fun we're having playing music together. You just can't stop a good feeling. The fun is back and that's all that really matters because let's face it, we aren't in it for the money.

In their 39th year as a touring group the Nace Brothers are poised for a larger audience. Brilliant songwriting, expressive vocals, soaring guitar and a rock solid rhythm section combine for entertainment at its best.

Pacific Street Blues & Americana Celebrates 30 Years

"Pacific Street Blues & Americana" radio show celebrates 30 years of being on air this year. The man who has been the host and programmer of the station is Rick Galusha.

Besides being the host of the show that runs on Sunday's from 9 a.m. to noon on 89.7 The River, Galusha is an associate professor of political science at Bellevue University in Bellevue, Nebraska.

Since he was a kid, Galusha has been interested in radio, so when he turned 18 he went to the University of Wyo-

ming for college and started to hang out at the campus radio station.

"Eventually I got to do some shifts on the air," he said. "So when I came back to Omaha to finish my undergraduate degree I was a classical and jazz DJ at KVNO at University of Nebraska at Omaha."

The 30th anniversary show on Dec. 13, will be a virtual simulcast for the 17th annual Toy Drive for the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation. You can listen live on 89.7 and watch the video online at **facebook.com/LiveFromMars-House** simultaneously. Live from Mars House will stream the videos on YouTube, Facebook and Twitch.

The show will feature national and international artists like Mark Farner, Low Cut Connie, Bob Malone and others will submit tracks, but a portion of the show will be tracks from local artists.

"I think there is a general impression that local means not as good," Galusha said. "So the idea is to position local artists next to national artists so people can see they are just as good as this band they already know."

Galusha said that blues music is the thread that weaves the show together, but on the show listeners will also hear Americana, classic rock and local artists.

"The theory is that people 45 and up will tune in and every third song they hear will be an artist that they know or a song that they know," he said. "I also use a lot of covers of songs."

He plays covers to refresh the music listening experience for listeners he said. It can also differentiate the station from a classic rock station and helps keep listeners interested and engaged.

Throughout the years, Galusha has had interviews with all types of musicians — John Entwhistle from The Who, Mickey Hart from the Grateful Dead and Sean Kelly from The Samples just to name a few.

He says the challenge of interviewing artists who have been in the industry for a long time is asking a question to move from the interview into a conversation.



"I was interviewing Dr. John and it was not going very well. I was bombing and he was not enjoying the interview and just going through the motions," he said. "So I asked him 'How'd you get Red Tyler back on the road?' and he looked at me and said 'How do you know who Red Tyler is?'"

"After that he realized he was talking to a true fan or at least someone who did their research," he continued. "By the end of the interview Dr. John had his arm around me and was saying 'You are one cool cat,' and that was very rewarding."

One of Galusha's favorite interviews was with Bill Wyman from the Rolling Stones.

At the end of the interview Galusha left the machine running and Wyman said "I've done a lot of interviews and this is the best one ever."

Galusha said that was quite a compliment coming from the guy who had been interviewed by almost every major music journalist in the world.

"Doing (radio) for so long we've developed a good audience," he said. 30 years is a pretty good milestone and say 'Hey that's good, that's cool."

Some of their most notable film contributions include music and or performances in "Six String Samurai", "Mail Order Bride", "Armageddon", "Skippy", "Melrose Place", "Fastlane", "Penn and Teller's Sin City Extravaganza", "VH-1 Behind the Music", and "MTV".

The Red Elvises have performed for large festivals, private parties, and played on massive stages such as 2005's Live 8 Benefit Concert. No matter where they perform, Igor & Red Elvises always bring the party with them.

Igor Yuzov was born in Germany, raised in Ukraine and studied in Russia. He grew up in the former Soviet Union, where folk music was the norm and rock'n'roll was illegal. A rebellious streak, however, led him to seek out the forbidden music. As soon as it became possible, Igor left Russia for America with his "Folk'n'Roll" band Limpopo and was personally greeted by Ronald Reagan. In 1993, Limpopo won Ed McMahon's Star Search and their popularity began to blossom. In 1995, Igor dreamed that Elvis Presley came to him and told him to start playing rock'n'roll. Igor and his Russian friends became Red Elvises and gave street performances on Santa Monica's 3rd Street Promenade. As their crowds grew larger, the City of Santa Monica ordered them to discontinue their street performances. Evolving over the years, Igor's music has been labeled "Siberian Surf Rock" which contains humorous lyrics and grooves that force his audience to dance. Over the past 20 years, Red Elvises have constantly toured all over the world with occasional breaks to record new music and to participate in film and television projects.

CD Review



Sarah Jarosz World On The Ground

2020 - Rounder Records



Maybe it's my age, but anymore I tend to gravitate to albums that make me feel good and shake my head at the incredible talents of the artist(s). 2020's "World On The Ground" by Sarah Jarosz is one of those gravitational albums. No pun intended. It pulls you in and won't let go. Most of the songs were inspired by growing up in her hometown

of Wimberly, TX, about an hour outside of Austin. This is her fifth studio album, and it has been nominated for two Grammy Awards, Best Americana Album and Best American Roots Song for "Hometown".

Jarosz's music is Folk/Americana, seasoned with a sprinkling of Bluegrass. Her voice is calming and soothing, similar to the feeling I get when listening to Alison Krauss. She is an incredible musician. I especially enjoy her mandolin playing. She is also proficient on guitar and banjo. Her smile will knock you out.

"World On The Ground" is a collaboration with John Leventhal, who produced the album. He also co-wrote four of the songs with Jarosz and plays various instruments on the album. Jarosz is credited as the sole writer of five of the songs. The traditional song "Little Satchel" is the album's closing track, and it features Jarosz playing banjo, clawhammer style.

"Hometown" is my personal favorite. It's about a girl that left town with big dreams, "somewhere they fizzled out, now she's back in her hometown." The song also includes the verse, "What makes a life complete? Roads traveled and people you meet? Or is it just the silence of the times in between?" "Maggie" is a song about a girl that left town and never came back. "Drive across the desert in a blue Ford Escape. Hopefully this car will live up to its name."

At age 29, Jarosz has the world in front of her. If you are not familiar with Jarosz or her music, there is a 54 minute YouTube video where Jarosz performs songs from "World On The Ground" and other songs from her catalog.

Corner Bar Closes Doors After Nearly 40 Years in Downtown Fremont

Although she had regularly visited the Corner Bar in Fremont throughout the 1980s, Tammy Trahan had no idea she would someday own the place.

"There's something about that building, and I have goosebumps right now saying it, it just holds some killer vibes that just welcomes you in," she said. "Obviously with any bar, we've had our issues with people, but it's just a place where everybody wanted to be."

After nearly 40 years of providing live entertainment and friendly service to the Fremont community, the Corner Bar closed its doors last Sunday.

The Corner Bar was owned by Trahan's husband, Randy, from 1981 until his death in 2008. From there, Trahan took over operations for the bar.

After marrying Randy Trahan in 1990, she started work as a day-shift bartender for six years. From the very start, Trahan said she was drawn to not only the owners' love for the bar, but for its live music.

"We had acts like Brad Cordle and the Mighty Jailbreakers, which were huge," she said. "We would take the pool tables down, flip them on their side, take the legs off and shove them in the office."

At that time, Trahan said downtown Fremont had around 10 bars downtown, including some that also had live music.

"It was a hub of activity, and all of us got along, it was crazy," she said. "It was probably one of the best times ever."

The Corner Bar's reputation as a live music hub was further expanded after the Trahans purchased the building next door, which was previously occupied by Claussen's Electronics, in September 2008.

"We bought that, and Labor Day weekend, we started tearing stuff up and started about a year's worth of work in three months," Trahan said.

However, on Dec. 10, 2008, Randy Trahan was killed in a car accident on his way home from Omaha just 10 days before the bar was set to open with the new expansion.

From there, Tammy Trahan took over as sole owner of the Corner Bar.

"It was probably about three years in that I tried to sell it, because I was just like, 'Man, what do I do?'" she said. "I was still working full time at the YMCA and trying to run the bar."

With the bar on the market for a year, Trahan said she was told by somebody that she probably wouldn't be able to run the bar anyway.

"I took it as a challenge, and I never back down from a challenge, and so I was like, 'Well, let's just see if I can do it,'" she said. "And so that's where my journey with music started on



the other side."

According to Trahan, the new venue expansion put the Corner Bar "on the map."

"It was probably about five years ago when things really started to click with the music, and I hit the national circuit," she said. "It just became a huge thing for traveling musicians."

The Corner Bar has hosted a variety of musicians, including Grammy Award winner Paul Nelson and nominee Michael Charles, as well as Blues Music Award winner Bruce Katz and nominee Tas Cru.

Last January, Trahan attended the International Blues Competition in Memphis and said she heard many express their

admiration for the Corner Bar.

"I had never met these people before, and some of them had heard of me," she said. "So that was huge, and that totally blew my mind."

Although she doesn't know where her future will take her, Trahan said she'll always have the memories of the people who have walked through the Corner Bar's doors.

"There are so many stories, so many people that have been there, so many people that we have lost," she said. "I think that's the biggest thing right there, is just all of the people."

Trahan also thanked her customers for their support throughout the years. In providing a music venue for the public, she said music has always been therapeutic for her, and in turn, has wanted to give others that therapy.




JEREMIAH JOHNSON BAND CD Release Party!

Thursday, January 28th @ 6 pm (\$10) • Stocks n Bonds, Omaha

Jeremiah Johnson blends the sounds of the south, with Mississippi River blues and a touch of country flair. Emotionally charged southern rock, powered by the common man's passion for life and all the struggles in-between. Songs with meaning, a powerfully persuasive voice and master class musicianship. Johnson's early 2020 release, "Heavens to Betsy", #1 on Billboard Blues Album Charts (April 11, 2020). In the midst of

Born and raised in St. Louis, Jeremiah Johnson is the voice of Mississippi River blues blending with the struggles of everyday life. He began learning guitar at age 6, drawing inspiration from his rich St. Louis blues heritage and legendary guitarists, like Alvin Lee, Eric Clapton and Hank Williams Sr. and Jr. With these influences, Johnson began building his musical foundation.

After relocating to Houston, TX, in 1999, Johnson finished in first place for three consecutive years at the Houston Regional Blues Challenges, sponsored by the Houston Blues Society. Johnson returned to St. Louis in 2009, and merged Texas style with STL blues to create the unique sound you hear today.

The 10 years Johnson lived and performed in Texas changed his musical style in ways you can still hear in his music today. In 2011, Johnson was the proud winner of the St. Louis Blues Society IBC Challenge and went on to the semifinals to represent St. Louis in Memphis, TN.

One year later, Sirius XM's B.B. King's Bluesville picked up the Jeremiah Johnson Band, where they can be heard nation-wide, and they have been playing his music ever since. You can also hear Jeremiah Johnson on Touch Tunes Jukeboxes in bars/clubs across the US and on radio stations around



the world. In September 2014, Johnson filmed his docu-concert, Ride the Blues, directed by Australian Producer/Director Gary Glenn, at the historic Capitol Theater in downtown Burlington, IA. The film is live music video about Johnson's rise to prominence, featuring intimate interview segments, still photography, guitar solos and stunning vocals. Donations from concert attendees were generously given to the theater and to

the National Blues Museum, connecting Johnson's roles of musician and music advocate. 2014 Johnson records Grind, produced by Devon Allman, features Grammy award winner Yonrico Scott on drums. Grind has been featured on SiriusXM's B.B. King's Bluesville, and on the international radio show "Confessing the Blues", broadcasting on 50 stations in 10 countries worldwide. Grind reached the #8 slot on the Billboard Blues Charts the week of November 7th, 2015.

Johnson follows the success of Grind with a self-produced release, Blues Heart Attack, released worldwide on July 22, 2016. This unique record is a blend of Johnson's entire musical career. "It's a combination of our earlier works, and then Grind," he explained. "There's horns and keyboard reminiscent of Brand Spankn' Blues, but also some heavy guitar driven tracks. It's the evolution of everything in a Blues Heart Attack." Special guest performers include Tom 'Papa' Ray on harmonica, and Nathan Hershey on keys. Blues Heart Attack reached #5 on the Billboard Blues Charts following its release in 2016.

After signing a record deal with Ruf Records in March of 2018, Jeremiah immediately went to Texas to record his debut Ruf Records release, Straitjacket, with BMA award winning Mike Zito producing. Straitjacket debuted #1 on iTunes New Blues Releases and #6 on Billboard Blues Album Chart and has been in the top of the Roots Music Report ever since. After a European tour with Mike Zito in the Beginning of 2019 and then followed by a Northeastern USA tour with Zito again, Johnson has truly electrified a whole new audience.


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
