




Samantha Fish w/Old No. 5's

Zoo Bar, March 11th @6 p.m., \$10 • 21st Saloon, March 13th @6:00 p.m., \$10

Have you been following Samantha's career? If not, you should take notice now, she is all over the place, pouring her heart out in her music, her shows, backing her favorites, never forgetting her fans. She is the whole package with icing on the cake. Kansas City-based Samantha Fish has been on a major roll ever since she teamed up with Cassie Taylor and Dani Wilde on Ruf's 2011 release. Girls with Guitars. Fueled by the trio's **Blues Caravan tour** of Europe and the U.S., she created an international buzz in the blues world. Later that same year she recorded "Runaway," her debut on Ruf, which mixed gutsy riff-blues rockers like "Down In The Swamp" with the mellow small-hours jazz of "Feelin' Alright," and earned her a string of rave reviews and radio airplay, climaxed by her winning the Blues Music Award (BMA) for "Best New Artist Debut" in

2012. Earlier this year Samantha joined labelmate **Devon Allman** for a sultry duet of the Tom Petty classic, "Stop Draggin' My Heart Around."

Rather than trying to duplicate her first success, on her latest release, 'Black Wind Howlin',' Samantha re-defines her sound throughout the tracks. She can be brutally rocking on cuts like the tour bus snapshot of "Miles To Go" ("Twelve hours to Reno/ten hours til the next show"), the swaggering "Sucker Born" ("Vegas left me weary, LA bled



me dry/skating on fumes as I crossed the Nevada line...") and the venomous "Go To Hell" ("Oh, this ain't my first rodeo/You hit yourself a dead end/Your voodoo eyes, ain't gonna cast a spell/So you can go to hell!").

It wasn't that long ago that a teenaged Samantha Fish showed up at her local Kansas City blues club, Knuckleheads Saloon, and began soaking up the sounds of visiting modern blues guitar masters like Mike Zito and Tab Benoit, then going back to '80s heroes like Stevie Ray Vaughan and following the lineage to the pre-war Delta masters. "I fell in love with it," she told Premier Guitar of her growing passion for the form, "and started doing my homework by listening to the old guys like Son House and Skip James." With those influences as her template, Samantha incorporated the sounds of the classic

rock of The Rolling Stones, Tom Petty, The Black Crowes and even a tip of the hat to Heart, in putting together a sound that would become her own. "It's all the sounds I grew up with," she explained at the time, "with my own spin." It's been a wild ride for Samantha Fish and she has proven her staying power every inch of the way. I don't have to tell you to get here early for this one. You already know it will be crazy and fun.



What's New with BluesEd?



Set in Stone is the latest band to join the BluesEd program.

Excitement and anticipation looms as the new BluesEd season is in full swing now. On February 9, bands and parents met at the Oak Hill Country Club near 120th and Q to kick off the new season. Set in Stone is the newest

band (formed January 2014) to join the BluesEd program, with five talented students. Far & Wide, which was formed in 2013, has three new members this year, Becca Erdman (vocalist), Drew Tvrdy (bass guitar), and Griffin Gillen (electric guitar).

BluesEd group Us & Them performed at the 5th Annual Winter Blues & BBQ, a benefit for Operation BBQ For Our Troops–Midwest Division, at Chance Ridge in Elkhorn on

Saturday, February 22. The Brad Cordle Band also performed at the event.

The first clinics of the year for the bands will be March 2. This year's clinician's include Craig Balderston, Ron Cooley, Carlos Figueroa, and Matt McLarney. The clin-

ics will feature two songs for each band to learn. Some of the songs selected for the March clinics include Jimmy Hendrix's "Red House," John Prine's "Angel from Montgomery," and Jimmy Reed's "Big Boss Man."

Omaha Blues Society's BluesEd: Keeping the Blues Alive | Feature Story

Take a look at the experience on Heather Newman's musical resume, and at the top, you'd expect to see the name of a well-traveled, nationally renowned performer: not a 19-year-old musician from Omaha.

She remembers back in 2007, then only 12 years old, when she was invited to play at Omaha's Holland Center with legendary blues composer and pianist Corky Siegel and former B.B. King drummer Sam Lay.

"They invited me to sing the last song of the night and then asked me to sign CDs with them afterwards," she says.

Again - she was only 12.

She also reminisces about the time in 2009


on her 14th birthday when Siegel came back to Holland Center with his Chamber Blues band and she played with him again. This time, the band came bearing gifts.

"The performance happened to be on my birthday and Corky and the group had a cake made for me backstage," she explains excitedly.

The only reason any of those opportunities presented themselves to her, she says, is because of the Omaha Blues Society's BluesEd program.

Started in 2002, BluesEd's mission is to keep the blues alive by giving middle school and high school students the opportunity to learn about blues and play in a band.

Director Barb Fisher, who co-directs the program with her



husband, Bill, and has two children of her own in the program, says it gives young musicians opportunities they might never have without BluesEd.

"It is amazing to watch kids who come in at age 12 and you can just see them blossom as part of this program," she says. "They learn so much and change so much. They have amazing opportunities. We just do it for the kids."

Each January, the program holds auditions for anyone between the ages of 12 and 18 who is interested in becoming part of BluesEd. The program's clinicians serve as judges and prospective students are judged on their skills such as knowledge of basic

chords, soloing and improvising.

Once accepted, the students are placed into a band. That band serves as the students' family throughout their whole time with BluesEd. They go to workshops together, they play and practice together, and inevitably, they become friends. As some bands routinely lose members because of students aging out of the program, BluesEd will accept only as many students yearly as they have room for in bands.

"You are with the same group of kids throughout BluesEd as you are when you audition," Fisher says. "As people age out, some of the bands lose members. Then we will either replace them with new students or leave the band how it is. They learn songs together as a group, and we have local

musicians who work with kids during workshops."

One of the main aspects of the student experience in BluesEd is the workshops and recitals. Fisher says student bands attend workshops every two weeks. At those workshops, students are taught by local musicians serving as the clinicians and are assigned as a band to learn songs to play at recitals. Workshops are held at various places such as 21st Saloon and P.S. Collective. The bands also participate in three to

four showcases and several other throughout the year.

After the auditions last January, BluesEd accepted 12 new students to bring the membership total to 39 this year. The program added a new band and now boasts six student blues bands: Dilemma, Far & Wide, Mojo Bag, Us & Them, Voodoo Vinyl and Set in Stone.

Fisher says the program provides outstanding opportunities for young blues musicians to feel like blues superstars. Some of the highlights of being a musician in BluesEd include playing shows at Lincoln's legendary Zoo Bar, playing with national touring blues bands and getting to work with and learn from the best blues musicians Omaha has to offer.

Newman, who left the program five years ago, says her experience with BluesEd is one she will remember for the

rest of her life. She is now a solo musician and says the program benefitted her tremendously and has helped her get to where she is now.

"I've made lifelong friends in the music industry which helps me with booking shows or travelling and so much more," she says. "The program gave me the foundations of my music career and not to mention an awesome resume. Thanks to the program, I am good friends with many great national blues

musicians, and I was able to meet and play with even more."

To anyone on the fence about joining the program, Newman says stop thinking and start doing. It is an experience that will help students develop into talented blues players and seasoned music veterans.

"Being in the program is fun and rewarding, plus it gets you great exposure," she says. "You learn a lot of valuable lessons and if they are thinking about continuing with music as a career, it will help them develop their preferences with their band and styles."





GUITARIST HADDEN SAYERS DEFIES STEREOTYPE

21st Saloon • March 27th 6:00 pm •\$10

Texas blues guitarist Hadden Sayers is quick to acknowledge his musical pedigree doesn't exactly conform to the "Meet devil at crossroads / Sell soul" floor plan.

"I was a middle-class white kid growing up in the suburbs of Houston," he says by phone last week before heading to Connecticut for a show tonight in the Mohegan Sun Wolf Den. "I went to college at Texas A&M, class of '89, and I don't profess in any way, shape or form to be from the Missis-

sippi Delta or to have undergone terrible experiences that led to the blues."

What happened was pretty simple. Sayers heard the music and fell in love.

"I listened to those Mississippi Delta guys and the greats and was just in awe how they were able to evoke a feeling; the melodicism touched me," Sayers says. "I'm fascinated how, a lot of times, it has nothing to do with musical dexterity. Suddenly, there's just this WOW moment. You can't get there at will, but you CAN get there. And I've spent my career trying to do that."

There are plenty of "wow" moments on his latest album, "Hard Dollar," which was released this past summer on the boutique Blue Corn Music label and hit #36 on the Americana Music Association and #21 on the Living Blues charts. But getting to the point where he recorded and released "Hard Dollar" was certainly the stuff of blues experience.

A clever songwriter whose lyrical concepts infuse typical bluesy subject matter and structures into all manners of topics, Sayers is also a distinct guitar player. In fact, his lyrical phrasing and rhythms seem a happy marriage of the typically distinct blues styles of Texas and southwest Louisiana – something very few players not named Clarence "Gatemouth" Brown have done.

For one thing, in Sayers' formative years as a musician during the college years in East Texas, the pool of musicians was talented but so small that everyone became skilled at various types of music – simply to cover all the requisite nightclub bases. As his career progressed, Sayers spent as much time playing blues in the Cajun/zydeco hotbeds as he did in the rockier blues scenes of Texas.

"Those three hours between Lafayette and Houston are incredibly dramatic," he says. "You'd be playing and influenced by pop and metal in east Texas and get to Louisiana and it was Clifton Chenier and Zachary Richard. And it's all good. And it's all filtered through the blues."

Eventually, Sayers began to lead his own band, established a catalog of several bestselling albums, and worked a lucrative, 200-dates-a-year touring schedule at festivals and in headline venues.

Then came some serious obstacles he describes as "bad



business deals, excuses, rip offs" - that lead to Sayers and his wife relocating to a small town in Ohio where she could pursue her career as a cancer researcher and Hadden could try to figure things out.

They bought a small cottage on the shore of a lake. "We figured we give it a Pine Sol scrubbing and break out the bedrolls and we'd be set," Sayers laughs. "It was in much worse shape than we'd thought."

A local elderly mason, Conard McCorkle,

basically took Sayers under his wing as an apprentice and, over the course of a few years, they rennovated the place. In addition to the carpentry work, though, Sayers said the friendship that he developed with McCorkle was an amazing and educational experience.

"It was a life lesson working with him," Sayers says. "He's a really great teacher who never scolds you. He's kind hearted and wise with no patience for bulls-. I learned so much from him, and he's just on the short list of the best people I've ever met."


If that all sounds more like Mitch Albom than T-Bone Walker, well, Sayers says "the blues" are not just about sorrow but also life itself and redemption – and McCorkle helped him to realize that.

Sayers began writing again with vigor, signed a new deal, recorded "Hard Dollar," and with his band is again feeling the "wow" factor of the blues. Too, he's been playing in Ruthie Foster's band as well as in the party band Phil Dirt & the Dozers.

"It's good to not always be the leader," Sayers says. "It takes the pressure off, and you learn how others do things and make it work. To make a living playing music is damned hard – and whether it's my own thing or side gigs, it's a variety and I love it and I've learned to never take it for granted."





CD Reviews



Damon Fowler · Sounds of Home

Blind Pig Records

Sounds of Home is Damon Fowler's third release on the Blind Pig label and sixth CD overall. Damon hails from the Tampa Bay area. He is a talented songwriter, guitar slinger (electric and lap steel on this offering) and vocalist. Recently he has been touring with Southern Hospitality, a group in which he shares the spotlight with J. P. Soars and Victor Wainwright. Following on the success of their hit CD, Easy Livin', produced by Tab Benoit, Damon returned to Tab and his Whiskey Bayou Studio for the production and

recording of this solo CD. Tab adds some writing, backing vocals and guitar to a few tracks.

Of the eleven tracks contained here, seven are originals that Damon either wrote or shares writing credit. The first track, "Thought I Had It All", is a bluesy southern rock number. I take this to be an introspective look at the lifestyle of a traveling musician. It introduces any new listeners to Damon's southern, slightly drawly vocal style and strong guitar work. Next comes the title track which is a good deal softer in both guitar and vocals. On this track, the vocals are shared with Tab's "Voice of the Wetlands" cohort Big Chief Monk Bou-

Billy Branch is no longer The New Kid on the Block, the title of his song from the great cd, Harp Attack!. That album, from twenty-five years ago, had Branch playing with his mentors James Cotton, Junior Wells, and Carey Bell.

It has been fifteen years since Branch last recorded, but it was

worth the wait. Branch is influenced by all the classic harp players from the past, but has a style of his own. This is exemplified by the instrumental dedicated to his mother, Song for My Mother, that has a cool jazz feel.

There is an obligatory Little Walter number, Crazy Mixed Up World, that has a nice traditional Chicago blues sound. But there are also string-laden ballads and funky horn driven songs.

Branch is a musician that has worked to keep traditional blues alive as shown in his work on the Blues in the Schools education program. But this cd shows him doing more than just rehashing the post-war blues. With an excellent backup band, he is pushing and expanding the genre.

The remainder of the tracks flow though various flavors of jazzy, swampy and country blues. If the fourth track, "Spark", makes you think there may be a little country in the boy then "Old Fools, Bar Stools and Me" and "Do It for the Love" will convince you it is so.

Two covers included, spotlight the diversity of Damon's interests and talent. The first is Elvis Costello's soft and tender ballad, "Allison"

which he covers in pretty close to the Elvis Costello style. The second is "TV Mama" (Johnny Winter's not Big Joe Turner's) where he is anything but faithful to the original. While Johnny's was traditional sounding with resonator guitar backing, Damon's is powerful and electric with heavy rhythm backing. Both of these profit from Damon's feel for the song.

Just to round it out **Sounds of Home** closes with the traditional spiritual "**I Shall Not Be Moved**". This simple song presented in a sparse traditional arrangement seems a fitting end to this collection of southern styled music since so much of it had its start in the church.

Damon is a talented young musician, singer and songwriter with a keen sense for musical style. **Sounds of Home** presents all of these in a great collection of songs and captures the feel of Damon's live shows.
