

THE ESKIMO BROTHERS

The Eskimo Brothers have become known one of Nashville's can't miss live shows. The honky tonk trio has honed their stage show and sound from nearly 300 shows per year and thousands of gig hours in the Music City honky tonks over the past 8 years. When not playing their usual residencies in Nashville and Memphis, the band tours throughout the United States.

The band's signature raw and rowdy sound appeals to a

wide audience, and much of it can be attributed to their own vast influences. Every Eskimo Brothers song has qualities that are essential to a Country melody and content, but played with the attitude that draws a Rock fan to a genre that they would usually not listen to.

The first and foremost obligation of the Eskimo Brothers since the band's first formation was to make sure every listener and show attendee has a good time through music. Second was sticking to a honest and raucous roots musical formula. Their wide range of influences in the Classic Country and Rock N' Roll music has given the band a driving tempo with blue collar stories of the road and heartache.

The Eskimo Brothers have been touring extensively throughout the United States in promotion of their latest album "LIVE N' LOUD". In the band's latest effort, they have dabbled with a wide range of styles of American roots music to give the listener a ride through a true honky tonk experience by way of their headphones, car stereo, or any pole barn in the world.

The Eskimo Brothers features David Graham ({Portland, OR) on guitar and vocals, Bill Van Vleet (Knoxville, TN) on drums, and Mark Robertson (Los Angeles, CA) on bass and vocals.

Amanda Fish began as a singer songwriter in late 2012, refining her original material as a solo act for 2 years before she formed her band in early 2014, a Roots Rock and Soul project featuring Amanda's signature gritty lyrics belted out with her 'from-the-gut' vocals.

In 2015, she released her first all-original LP, "<u>Down In The Dirt</u>", on VizzTone Label Group, for which she was awarded the 2016 "Sean Costello Rising Star" Blues Blast Music Award. Amanda became a semifinalist in the 2017 International Blues Challenge where she garnered acclaim from new fans and industry professionals alike.

From her performance at the IBC, she was able to start touring the US and Canada.

In 2018, Amanda released her second all original studio al-

bum, "<u>Free</u>", on VizzTone Label Group, debuting at #6 on the Billboard Blues Album Chart and nabbing a 2019 Blues Music Award for Best Emerging Artist Album.

Oye Como Va - Santana Tribute

Experience the energy of Oye Como Va that pays tribute to one of the greatest artists of all time....Santana! The band rocks with a full line of congas, timbales, drums, bass, guiotar, keyboard, singers and lead guitar.

Oye Como Va was formed by Marcos Eduardo Mora Barrientos and Michael

Pujado in 2017. As the musicians played across the Midwest they often crossed paths and felt it was time to put together an array of talented artists that could pay tribute to the legendary artist, Carlos Santana.

Marcos wanted the best percussionist in the region...and that guy was Michael Pujado from Chile. Pujado had been exposed to Latin rhythms from birth and it was naturally in his blood that brought life to his playing on the timbales and congas. Pujado brings a true art form to Omaha in which he has accompanied artists such as Kenny G, Arturo Sandoval, Quincy Jones and many others. Pujado agreed to join up with Marcos.

Marcos' family's musical roots date back to 1926 when his grandfather and brothers arrived to Omaha and would play the local circuit for decades. Growing up around music and dance just came natural to Marcos, who eventually played in traditional Mexican/Latin groups. He then learned to play rock and soul music—he loved the guitar and in his 20s he studied with Blues and R&B artists out of Kansas City and Chicago. Eventually Marcos would play every major event in Omaha such as Jazz on the Green, Summer Arts Festi-

val, Cinco de Mayo and many others—so this seemed like a better time than any to bring to Omaha a mix of talent that could portray Carlos Santana's music.

The group Oye Como Va is a high energy show that is filled with Santana's classics and a lot of great solos that also feature Al Irions on the hammond, Tomas Morales from Panama on percussion, Natalie Huerta on drums, Michelle Irions on vocals, Tori Huerta on vocals, Joe Gonzalez on bass and Dennis Hopp on rhythm guitar.

The band will play some of Santana's greatest hits such as: Oye Como Va, Black Magic Woman, Jingo, Smooth, She's Not There, Maria Maria, No One To Depend On and many more!



On the Loss of Eddie Van Halen

I'll be honest, I am not really into "sharing" these days on FB..... but I'll give it a shot.

I was 7 years old in August of 1978.

I was playing at my friend Brian Ray's house and I went upstairs to use the restroom. When I came out I heard something coming from his older brother Walter's room. It was metallic and shiny and exploding all at once. In my 7 year old head it sounded like the new movie "Star Wars" that had just come out earlier that summer. I had never heard anything like it before. Up until this age I had only heard my father's Big Band records and maybe Jackson 5 on TV. I didn't know what a guitar was let alone what it sounded like. I walked into Walter's room and just stood there and listened. Walter had gone downstairs and his record was playing "Eruption" by Van Halen. I was mesmerized.

Walter came back in and pushed me - "why are you in my room?"

I said "What Is that?" he said "Van Halen"....I said "No, WHAT Is that?" and he said "it's a Guitar".

That was it. That is the moment my life changed forever.

I would never be the same again. I had no idea this instrument existed and certainly not this music. I went straight home and told my parents I wanted a guitar and a record player. We were poor so I would have to wait until my birthday in November for the record player and a copy of the Van Halen record of my own. The record player was a Snoopy Suitcase. I listened to that record over and il based that record on what all other music should sound like from that year forward. I got the guitar for Christmas a month later. It was a red and black Harmony from JC Penney with a small Harmony amplifier and a book to learn guitar. No one in my family was musical at all so I just beat the shit out of that guitar trying to make it sound like the Van Halen record.

I have been doing that for over 40 years.

I decided when I was 7 years old that I would be an entertainer and play the guitar like Eddie Van Halen.....even though I had no idea how to do it. I based my entire life on this man and his guitar.

I love all music and all styles, but Eddie was and is my absolute favorite guitar player ever. He was the best Rock guitarist to live and the most innovative in my lifetime. No one else has come after him that influenced so many guitar players that it almost made the guitar gross...he literally almost ruined the guitar and the Rock genre by the never ending list of players that tried to emulate him. I was lucky enough to see Van Halen In concert 8 times over my lifetime including 12th row in Houston on the last tour, which was a dream come true....I will never forget it.

I have listened to every song, every note played - thousands of times. It always makes me feel good and always inspires me to continue playing music and bringing the joy.

65 years old seems young, but what a 65 years it was.

An immigrant who came here on a boat - his family shared a house with 4 other families when they arrived and slept on the floor. He holds patents that changed the guitar and electronics.

He changed culture, music and an instrument beyond repair. His band sold 75 million albums worldwide.

Today Is a very sad day to me....and it happened on Yonrico Scott's birthday nonetheless while I am recording new music at Dockside Studios.

Thank you Eddie Van Halen. You changed my life and most certainly for the better. You will always get the credit in my book.

God bless your life and your family.

TRAVIS THE BAND

Thursday, December 3rd @ 6 pm Toy Drive for Pine Ridge Drop Off 5 to 8 pm Stocks n Bonds, Omaha



In the summer of 1971 Albert "Red" Travis, Instrumental Music Director at Omaha South High School, had the idea of forming a brass rock band that could perform covers of some of the most contemporary music of the time. Artists like Chicago, Blood Sweat and Tears, Tower of Power, Earth Wind and Fire, Cold Blood, Wayne Cochran, Chase and many more.

His idea stemmed from the current OPS curriculum of the times in modular scheduling. This type of scheduling allowed students numerous free "mods", during the course of the school day. The format provided students to spend their free time in classes that they enjoyed and truly had a passion for. Hence, students that had a passion for music spent the majority of their free mods in the band room. Mr Travis had noticed that many of his students had developed far and beyond what the average instrumental music student would have, primarily based on the additional time they were spending developing their prowess on their particular instruments.

Mr Travis had the perfect training grounds for testing his idea. He utilized his Stage/Lab band, the equivalent of the Big Bands of previous generations. The difference was, that instead of focusing the majority of the repertoire on the classics of Duke Ellington, Count Basie, Stan Kenton and others, he arranged and scored the charts of the modern contemporary artists aforementioned. The proof of his successful idea was affirmed by the recognition of the OSHS Stage band in state wide competitions from 1970 through 74. It became one of the most decorated Stage Band projects in Nebraska High School History.

Essentially, the Stage Band became the recruiting pool and audition process for the Brass Rock Band Travis. Many of the original members came from classes dating from 1969 through 1980.

TRAVIS Generation 1, consisted of 9 members, Bass, Guitar, Drums, 4 trumpets, tenor sax, and Front person and Vocalist. Mr Travis was undecided as to who would front the band. He held auditions with very talented males and females and when consulting with the band's agent Bob Belitz and some of the senior members, it was determined that a female would front the group.

TRAVIS assembled approximately 90 minutes of music and was entered into the 1972 Omaha Battle of the Bands, an open air event in downtown Omaha featuring some of the most popular area bands of the era. This was Travis's first ever performance and its inaugural opening as a new Omaha area band. At the end of the day, the public voted Travis as the winner of the competition and thus began a 10 year history in the Omaha music scene.

CD Review



Elvin Bishop & Charlie Musselwhite 100 Years of Blues

Alligator Records (2020)



Although it's more like 110 years, 100 years is a reference to Elvin Bishop's and Charlie Musselwhite's combined experience in the music industry. A line from the title track declares, "We've been around since the Dead Sea was sick." They have played together before, but this is their first album together as co-leaders. Both ended up in

Chicago in the early 1960's at an early age. Bishop moved from Oklahoma to attend the University of Chicago. Musselwhite moved from Tennessee in hopes of finding a good paying job.

Bishop met and became friends with Paul Butterfield. Bishop became a part of The Paul Butterfield Blues Band and their debut album was released in 1965. In 1967 Mussel-white released his debut album, "Stand Back!". The rest, as they say, is history. Bishop (78) and Musselwhite (76) are two of the elder statesmen of the blues but they can still bring it on home.

4 of the 12 songs were written by Bishop, 4 by Musselwhite, and they co-wrote the title track. The other 3 songs are covers. Musselwhite sings on "West Helena Blues" (Roosevelt Sykes) and "Help Me" (Sonny Boy Williamson II). Bishop takes over the vocals on "Midnight Hour Blues" (Leroy Carr). Bob Welsh plays accompaniment on each of the 12 songs, 7 on guitar and 5 on piano. Kid Andersen plays upright bass on 5 of the songs. Andersen recorded, mixed, and mastered the songs on the album, and he was a co-producer, along with Bishop, Musselwhite, and Welsh.

It seems a bit strange that the title track closes out the album. Both Bishop and Musselwhite introduce themselves and reminisce about their early days in Chicago. Bishop is rambunctious and ready to raise a ruckus on "Birds Of A Feather", "What The Hell?", and "Old School". Musselwhite is a little more refined and less rowdy on "Good Times", "If I Should Have Bad Luck", "Blues, Why Do You Worry Me", and "Blues For Yesterday". "South Side Slide" is the lone instrumental. The title refers to the south side of Chicago, the home of countless blues clubs and blues artists over the years.

Both artists are still relevant and resilient. It's refreshing to hear them together, reveling in each other's remarkable talents. We shall see if Bishop and Musselwhite will reap the rewards when it comes time for Grammy and Blues Music Awards nominations.
